 - We also host the Greater New Orleans Traffic Safety Committee, who meet monthly to discuss traffic safety issues and exchange information. The committee is composed of area law enforcement agencies, traffic engineers, safety advocacy groups (NSC, AARP, AAA, Motorcycle Awareness Committee), Department of Transportation, Federal Highway Administration, LA Highway Safety Commission, Operation Lifesaver (RxR), as well as businesses that are impacted by traffic issues, such as construction and transportation companies.
 - We conduct an annual safety awards contest among our member companies. The categories are for occupational safety and fleet safety. The fleet contest is divided again between passenger vehicles and trucks. The participating companies submit

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their incident and frequency rates and are measured against the average. The awards are made according to the size of the companies, so that companies compete against those of similar size. The award contests promotes a sense of competition between companies and raises the awareness of safety among their employees.

- Participants attend our driver improvement courses for a variety of reasons: some courts order traffic violators to attend, many companies require all who drive company vehicles or personal vehicles for company business to attend, new drivers must take a course to get their drivers licenses, good drivers may qualify for insurance discounts after completing a course.
- We have a certified Child Passenger Safety Technician who assists in area child safety seat check up events.
- We also conduct safety & health presentations to safety and civic organizations, such as the Kiwanis Club, Rotary Club, Delta Safety Society, American Society of Safety Engineers and the local Emergency Medical Technician association (NORR, LANREMT).
- 10. Evaluation: After each of our classes, participants complete a course evaluation form. Evaluations are reviewed by the instructors and the administration to assure course content, materials and presentation styles meet the participants' needs. If adjustments are needed, they are made. The administration continuously updates course materials when changes in regulations, laws or injury/illness data dictate. We evaluate national injury, illness and death statistics, as well as state and local data.  - Breast milk has been proven to be the best source of health and nutrition for infants. This class is highly recommended for all parents to help them make informed decisions about breastfeeding. Internationally Board Certified Lactation Consultants offer instruction on breastfeeding techniques, prevention of problems and breastfeeding after returning to work.

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- Sibling Preparation
 - Becoming a big brother or sister is an exciting event. This class is designed for children ages 3 to 10 and their parents. This class deals with the changes of a growing family and appropriate interaction with the new baby. Activities include how to hold a baby properly, diapering, drawing, doll play, videos and stories.
- Becoming a Woman
 - Girls, ages 9 to 12, with their mother or a guardian, learn about the changes that come with adolescence. Topics include anatomy, body image, menstruation and feminine hygiene.
- Becoming a Man

The Geriatric Behavioral Health Unit is designed to cater to the unique needs of seniors, providing the safe and comfortable environment essential to successful treatment.

- Cardiac Services
 - ELECTROCARDIOGRAM (EKG)
 - An EKG is an atraumatic, non-invasive procedure that documents the electrical conduction of the heart from a variety of areas. There is virtually no patient preparation, and no contraindications. This procedure is performed on inpatients and outpatients of all ages.
 - Holter Monitoring
 - This procedure records the heart rhythm and electrical activity of the heart for a 24 hour period. This recorded information is stored on an audio tape for viewing on a holter scanner that displays each heart beat and makes many measurements such as intervals, rate, and elevations. A diary is kept by the patient to correlate symptoms with specific cardiac activity. This again is an atraumatic non-invasive procedure with no side effects or patient preparation. This procedure is suitable to both inpatients and outpatients of all ages.
 - 2D ECHOCARDIOGRAPHY
 - This is a non-invasive scanning procedure that uses ultrasound to image the heart from various positions that are recorded on both video tape and hard copy. This is then presented to a cardiologist for interpretation. This procedure requires little or no patient preparation and can be done on both inpatients and outpatients of any age. Information gathered from this procedure can be helpful in detecting the function and size of walls, chambers, and valves of the heart.
 - CARDIAC DOPPLER WITH COLOR FLOW
 - This is a non-invasive method of monitoring blood flow through the cardiac structure. This procedure reveals blood flow direction and velocity with a color map and a graphical display of flow direction and intensity with simultaneous audio correlation.
 - TRANSESOPHAGEAL ECHO (TEE)
 - TEE is a procedure similar to an endoscope. A small flexible tube with an ultrasound probe mounted on the end is passed through the mouth and into the esophagus. From here the physician can manipulate the transducer to better visualize certain structures such as valves, walls, descending aorta, atrial appendage, etc. for any abnormalities. This procedure does require a Cardiologist present to perform the procedure. Also, the patient must present with an empty stomach and have an IV in place for the administration of sedatives to relax them for the procedures. A topical anesthetic is also

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sprayed into the throat to ease the placement of the transducer into the esophagus.

- C.V. MAX STRESS TEST
 - This procedure evaluates a patient's cardiac electrical conduction while under the stress of walking on a treadmill at increasing speeds and elevations. A Cardiologist is present for this procedure, therefore, the non-cardiologist attending physician should arrange a cardiology consult. Patient preparation would include an empty stomach ie.nothing by mouth for at least four hours before the procedures. Male patients must have their chest shaved; in the areas for electrode placement once they arrive in the Cardiology department. Limitations would exclude anyone who could not walk on the treadmill because of physical limitations. This procedure is performed on both inpatients and outpatients in any age group within the limitations.
- ICD-Implantable Cardioverter Defibrillator
 - The ICD is implanted in persons who have experienced a cardiac arrest and/or who have met specific cardiac criteria. The device contains an internal defibrillator and pacemaker. The defibrillator acts as a monitor during the first critical seconds of cardiac arrest.
- Cardiac Rehabilitation
 - Cardiac Rehabilitation is a program at West Jefferson Medical Center dedicated to care for adult patients who have been diagnosed with cardiovascular disease. We work with each patient, encouraging them to make healthy lifestyle changes...and hopefully prevent future heart-related problems.
- Neuroscience Program
 - Developed for patients and families, the Neurosciences program at West Jefferson Medical Center offers a patient-focused approach to care across several areas including neurology, neuro-surgery, neuro-radiology and neuro-oncology. Recognized for quality, awards such as the 2008 American Heart Association Get With The Guidelines Silver Performance Award for Stroke Care and a 2007 Distinguished Achievement Award from the Commission on Cancer of the American College of Surgeons is testimony to the work being done by doctors, nurses and healthcare professionals.

 - From the diagnostic setting to post-treatment and comprehensive rehabilitation, including a SwimEx Therapy Pool in the on campus Aquatics Center, staff support physicians in the care of patients with diseases and conditions of the spine.
